Beware The Scammers Again

North Yorkshire Trading Standards have received the list of scams and frauds reported by residents to Action Fraud. There are a number of themes they wish to share with you.

Residents are continuing to be called by someone claiming to be from Microsoft/BT stating there is a problem with your computer and asking the victim to download a piece of software called Teamviewer which allows the criminal to gain access to the victims computer. This is a scam and victims have lost several thousands of pounds to these criminals.

Another frequent scam is the caller claiming to be from HMRC claiming there is an outstanding bill and a court order has been obtained for payment and that unless the 'victim' pays immediately, bailiffs will be sent round. Often the criminal will ask for payment in i-tune vouchers. Again this is a scam: HMRC never conduct their business making demands by phone.

Finally we are seeing an increase in reported 'Romance Scams' where victims are duped into sending money to someone they have met on the internet. Quite often the criminal will give some

sob story about how a child is ill or they need money quickly to persuade the victim to transfer thousands of pounds into a foreign account on the promise they will get the money back or that the person will come to the UK to marry the victim.

In all these cases the advice is the same: If you are contacted by the telephone or on the internet and you have any doubt whatsoever, terminate the call. Please do not fall victim to these fraudsters.

Leaders: 'Increase Council Tax On Second Homes'

Increasing council tax on second homes in the Yorkshire Dales National Park is one of a number of measures being proposed as part of efforts to help attract and retain families to live and work in the area.

Civic leaders from across the Dales are joining forces to look at seeking approval for a five year pilot, which would see a significant local increase in council tax on second homes introduced.

Currently there are about 1,500 second homes in the Park, representing more than ten per cent of the total housing stock.

Cllr Foster, a Member of the National Park Authority, considers that the local authorities have a duty to their communities to try to address the causes before it is too late: "All across the north of England we have seen a flight of young people from the more remote rural areas like the Dales - and only a trickle of young people and families have come in to replace them.

"Action in four key areas - economic development and job creation. broadband infrastructure. retention of vital local services, and housing - is needed. On housing, local authorities in the Dales are putting an immense amount of work into trying to get new, affordable homes built. But so many homes are being lost to second home ownership that the positive effects of the new homes are being cancelled out. I think we've come to the point where we would not be doing our duty if we didn't take a serious look at

second homes. Do we really want to be known as the generation that sat on our hands while our communities fell apart?

"Second homes are typically unoccupied for much of the year. That results in a substantial economic loss to the local community and - perhaps even more important - a loss of vitality. It doesn't seem unreasonable to suggest that second home owners should be asked to help make good these losses. Higher Council Tax charges on second homes could be the answer. additional money raised through this pilot could be ploughed back into community services."

Richmondshire District Council Leader, Councillor Yvonne Peacock, who is also a member of the National Park Authority, said: "I want our Dales communities to keep going and to thrive, and that's why I want to see action on the really big issues such as economic development and housing. It is becoming increasingly clear that one of the ways we can help local communities is by prioritising their needs over the needs of second homeowners.

"Young people have left the upper Dales in high numbers and one of the reasons why so many have left in recent years - and why so few families are attracted here at the moment- is that good, affordable housing is out of their reach. A large council tax increase on second homes could change that.

"Incentivising the sale or renting out of second homes could bring more homes back into full-time occupancy. For a twentysomething who returns from work each evening to a bedroom in their parents' house, passing several empty houses on the way must seem very wrong."

The Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority Chairman, Carl Lis, added: "The Authority cannot achieve its two statutory purposes of conserving the landscape and promoting its enjoyment by the nation without strong, viable communities. There is no doubt that we need to retain more of our young people, and attract others from outside the park, but at the moment we've little chance of doing either because there is not enough available or affordable housing. The situation cannot be attributed to the high number of second homes alone - but it is certainly a factor.

"By stimulating the housing market, second homes have helped to create an affordability gap between house prices and local wages. The knock-on effects are a 'flight' of working age people, school closures and loss of services "

Upper Dales Family History Group Part 1

October's speaker was Dr Graham Rogers on 'Getting through the Daily Grind: North Yorkshire Family Life and 19th-Century Rural Economy'. Graham had researched and analysed a variety of records at the North Yorkshire County Record Office to build up a vivid picture of the daily experience of ordinary agricultural labourers and their families in the local area, the type of work people did, wages, the food they ate, the clothes they wore and what type of houses they lived in. He explained some of the changes that occurred in the economy and population in the 19th century and gave a comprehensive list of sources for his information including census, tithe, charity, estate, farm, school and even clothing club records.

Using Dalton as an example he showed the changes during the 19th century in the number of people working on the land. At one time the narrow crofts behind each house, supplemented by common rights of grazing, would have allowed each household to be self sufficient, but over time this became unviable and

they had to live by selling their labour. The Field Books for some estates gave more detail - cultivated land created a high demand for labour, not just of men but their entire families. Wages for agricultural labourers were low in comparison with many other jobs and the demand was seasonal, meaning that income varied according to the time of year. Women were paid much less than men and many workers were not employed full time, so although they had a daily rate, they were not earning this every day. On some estates operating a piece work system the situation was even worse, with wages dependent on, for example, the weight or number of acres of turnips pulled. School log books showed how often children were absent at some times of year when their labour was essential in the fields.

Living conditions were often basic and cramped, especially where large farmhouses were divided up into homes for several families. Bread was the dietary staple and Graham explained that in 1790, 84 % of earnings were spent on food, 64% on bread alone. One hundred years later by 1893, 72% of wages went on food, and 38% was on bread. By then the diet was more varied but a labouring man needed

which came from bread.

There were several slides of paintings by Sir George Clausen who specialised in pictures of rural workers and gave a good idea of the type of clothes they were wearing and the conditions in which they laboured. Village clothing clubs helped people to afford clothes new in monthly instalments topped up by subscriptions from wealthy landowners but these were strictly for hard wearing, no nonsense working garments, typical of Clausen's pictures.

The Wonders of Saturn

The images on these two pages were taken by the probe Cassini. Its 20 year mission ended on Sept. 15, 2017, as the on board power source failed and the craft plunged into Saturn's atmosphere.

Opposite Page: Top

The planet Saturn, as seen from the probe, 95 times the mass of the Earth and with 62 known moons orbiting, Saturn is famous for its rings. Formed from dust, ice and chunks of rock, these rings are still being formed.

Middle

The planet Earth, as seen from Saturn, 890 million miles away, it took the Cassini probe 7 years to reach its destination.

Bottom Left

Two of the many shepherd moons, that keep the rings of Saturn in order.

Bottom Right

Saturn also has its own flying saucer shaped moon, named Pan, this is also a shepherd moon, clearing the Enke Division, the gap between the rings that can be seen from Earth

This Page: Left

The moon Mimas, has a spectacular hexagonal crater, cause unknown at present as all other craters seen in the solar system are circular.

Right

Enceladus, another bizarre moon, has geysers of water near its south pole, indicating some form of geothermal activity 940 million miles from the Sun.





Astronomy In The Two Dales

January winter nights - cold, crisp and dark for hours and hours and ... lovely! The deep winter night sky is dominated by the constellation of Orion, the Hunter. The chart opposite shows the sky to the south east at about 8pm on January 17th.

The seven brightest stars of Orion form an hourglass shaped asterism. The three stars close together - the Belt - are about a third the way up from the horizon to overhead. The four corner stars mark imagined shoulders and knees.

The slightly orange star at the upper left 'shoulder' (north east) is Betelgeuse - a 'cool' red supergiant that is so large it would occupy almost as far as Jupiter if it replaced our sun. It is expected to explode and become a supernova within a million years, quite soon in astronomical timescales. In contrast, the star to the lower right (south west) is Rigel, a 'hot' blue/white star.

Orion's Sword hangs below the Belt. If you look carefully around that area when your eyes are adapted to the dark, you may see a small fuzzy patch - The Great Orion Nebula (fancy word for space cloud). The Orion Nebula is big ... 24 light years across and is where stars and planetary systems (like our own solar system) are formed from collapsing clouds of gas and dust. The radiation from the newly formed stars causes the surrounding nebula to glow and become visible. A spotting scope or pair of binoculars will show a slightly brighter smudge, maybe a pair of bird

wings shape.

The brightest star in the night sky - Sirius - is down and left of Orion in the constellation Canis Major (Greater Dog), and twinkles many colours due to the earth's atmosphere.

MOOCs - Massive Open Online Courses - a term coined in 2008, are online educational resources that use a range of collaborative tools to deliver an amazing array of subject matter, including astronomy and cosmology - many of which are free. 

Celebrating 10 Years Of The Reeth Lecture

In 2008, I wanted to find a suitable event to hold in Reeth's Methodist Chapel during the 2009 Swaledale Festival. Performance events were problematic because of the layout; it was designed for one person talking in the pulpit, so I decided on a lecture and set about finding someone to deliver it. Then the pun hit me and the Reeth Lectures were born.

Since 1948, BBC Radio's annual Reith Lectures have been given by leading figures on a variety of subjects to mark the contribution to broadcasting by Sir John (Lord) Reith, the corporation's first director-general. Following the BBC's lead, I decided that well-known personalities would be ideal for our Reeth Lectures and I decided that they should talk expertly about something other than themselves, and avoid politics, religion and sport - mainly because I didn't want fights breaking out.

The first Reeth Lecturer was Sir Roy Strong who spoke about saving English Parish Churches, which was appropriate because many are used as Festival venues. Roy was followed in 2010 by his old friend Brian Sewell who chose 'What is the point of Art History'. (I had just embarked on an Art History degree course at the time, but Brian didn't put me off.) Brian was controversial and hilarious. We spent an extremely enjoyable day together, during which he launched our children's art exhibition at Bowes Museum. We kept in touch until his death a few years later.

Loyd Grossman spoke about

conservation in 2011, and while he was here he went searching for the chapel's original harmonium - eventually finding it in the Swaledale Museum where he gave an impromptu recital! In 2012, Time Team archaeologist Carenza Lewis's talk on her 'Big Dig' project inspired the SWAAG diggers to set up a Big Dig event in Reeth and Grinton, which Dr. Lewis launched.

In 2013, Lucinda Lambton spoke eloquently about toilets (mostly fancy Victorian ones). Meteorologist Michael Fish's 2014 talk on climate change made us think, and made us laugh when he blamed his infamous 1987 hurricane aaff on Bill Giles! 2015's quest Adam Hart-Davis, whose father had lived in Marske asked 'Are we alone in the universe?', and in 2016, Andrew Graham -Dixon gave a brilliantly entertaining talk on 'Appreciating Art'. In 2017, the pianist and musicologist Professor David Owen Norris cleverly echoed Brian Sewell's lecture with 'What is the point of classical music?'

The series has developed a special character, partly because the shameless pun seems to encourage a certain humour in talks which otherwise can be rather serious, and because the lecturers have mostly been a little eccentric, to say the least.

I like the fact that people talk about the Reeth Lectures throughout the year and approach me with suggestions for the next one. Do keep the ideas coming but don't be disappointed if they don't materialise. The Reeth Lecture is very difficult to programme; I probably invite ten people for every one that says 'yes'. Well-known personalities are reluctant to commit to a talk in Yorkshire months in

advance in case they have to turn down a television series later. Some wait for months before telling me they can't come, and I have to start again.

It's sad that the Methodist Chapel - the venue for the first eight lectures - has closed. We are fortunate, however, that the good people of the Congregational Church have welcomed us warmly and saved the Reeth Lecture from extinction.

I'm pleased to say that every Reeth Lecture has sold out, but I often meet people who left it too late to book. Well here's a heads-up:

The 10th Reeth Lecture will be given by the popular mathematician Marcus du Sautoy on 7 June 2018. His talk, 'A Song to Symmetry', revolves around the symmetry and hidden codes in the music of J.S. Bach, especially in his iconic keyboard masterpiece 'Goldberg Variations' which will be performed twice during the Festival. Online booking opens on 26 March, so please mark these dates in your diary.

If you are particularly worried about missing out on this, or any other events, you might consider subscribing to our 'Festival Friends' scheme. Members benefit from an exclusive advance booking period, amongst other things. Details on our website.

Upper Dales Family History Group Part 2

November's speaker was Dr David Severs on his research into 'Wensleydale Clockmakers and their

Clocks', illustrated with photographs of the clocks which had been in an exhibition in Leyburn during the summer, along with additional illustrations to give an idea of the way the technology and design had changed over the years.

The earliest examples from the 17th century only had an hour hand, with half and quarter hours shown on the dial face. Improvements in design eventually enabled the addition of a minute hand, eventually along with second hands and extra dials to show phases of the sun and moon. All these extras came, of course, with a price tag the sophistication of vour timepiece was definitely α status symbol.

As well as making clocks and watches (and sometimes sundials) an important part of the clockmaker's work was visiting the more prestigious local houses once a week to wind and adjust the clocks and one particular man was noted for always dressing in his best to make his rounds.

David also gave the background to his research and listed some of the many publications, of varying degrees of accuracy which he had used to compile his list of local clockmakers, including some families which were omitted altogether from some of the standard texts. Many of the families

followed the trade for generations, passing down their skills from father to sons, and with daughters marrying into other clock making families. Most also trained apprentices who would often move away, taking their skills with them and setting up business in a new area.

The earliest local clock maker David had identified was John Oaden of Bainbridge, born around 1665, originally at Halifax. John was a Quaker and a friend of George Fox; it is thought he came to Bainbridge because of persecution elsewhere. He made fairly simple, single handed, 30 hour clocks (needing daily winding). Interestingly, by this period, it would have been possible to make two handed clocks but Oaden chose not to - either because he was fairly old fashioned himself or because his clients were. Apparently many people found the minute hand hard to read after being used to a simpler, albeit less accurate dial.

Many other names and anecdotes followed, bringing the story right up into the 20th century, showing how the designs had changed from plain and engraved metal faces to elaborate designs, painted to fit the requests of the buyers. Even the case was significant, the shape of the doors indicated if the clock was made in the north or south of the country. Flat topped, or 'cottage' clocks were made for houses with low ceilings, more elaborate swan necked or horned examples were for larger buildings.

This was a fascinating talk, crammed with research into local families as well as a masterly overview of the changing face of dales clocks and some of the far flung places they had ended up.

Tips for defrosting your wind screen safely and effectively:

- While you use a scraper and de-icer
 on the outside of your car, starting
 the engine, switching on heated rear
 screen and mirrors and allowing airconditioned air to circulate to gently
 warm the glass is the most effective
 way to clear frosted glass.
- Stay with the car all the time if you must go back indoors switch off and lock the car.
- Do not drive off until all of the glass is clear
- Remember not to leave wipers in 'auto' when frost is expected - if wipers are frozen to the glass the wiper motor could be damaged. Don't try to force frozen wipers off the glass
- Never use just-boiled water to clear glass - it could crack the glass, freezes quickly and could ice your wipers to the glass
- Clear all snow off the car, a soft brush is effective - making sure the front grille is clear (otherwise there is risk of the engine overheating).

Bogus Bailiffs

There has been an increase in cold calls to the public from bogus bailiffs requesting payments for a "phantom" debt. The fraud involves being coldcalled by someone purporting to be a bailiff working on behalf of a court, attempting to recover funds for a nonexistent debt. Fraudsters are requesting payment by bank transfer and if refused they threaten to visit the people's homes or place work in order to recover the debt that is owed. From the reports we have received a range of different businesses and individuals are being targeted.

Though this type of fraud can occur throughout the UK, we have found that significant levels of reports are being made from those in the Yorkshire area. **Key facts about bailiffs**

A bailiff is someone who has a legal power to collect certain debts. They may do this by asking you to pay what you owe, or by taking and selling your belongings to raise the money.

Bailiffs are only used to recover certain debts such as council tax, child support and compensation orders. Bailiffs are not used to recover debts relating to private advertisement; these would be collected by debt

Debt collectors do not have the same legal powers as bailiffs and will not have special court authorisation to act. If you're not sure whether you're dealing with a bailiff or a debt collector, check the Citizens Advice website.

How to protect yourself

- Make vigorous checks if you ever get a cold call associated with a bailiff.
- If you work for a business and receive a call or visit from bailiffs or debt collectors, be sure to speak with your manager or business owner first. Never pay the debts yourself on behalf of the business you work for; some fraudsters have suggested employees do this whilst talking with them, suggesting they can then be reimbursed by their employer, when in reality the debt is non-existent.
- Request details of the debt in writing to confirm its legitimacy.
- Do not feel rushed or intimidated to make a decision based on a phone call. Take five and listen to your instincts.
