

Hello again and thanks for reading!

I said all my thanks in September when I announced my retirement but I would just like to reiterate them and to say that the Gazette has never been in such a strong position with such a great management team. I feel confident that with your support they will do a great job managing your magazine.

It is coming up to that time I love most of all

It is coming up to that time I love most of all -Christmas. But it is also the time when many do not really see the true meaning because they do not allow themselves to see.

I came across a story the other day written by Sema Lagerlof, a Swedish author who was the first woman to receive the Nobel Prize for Literature.

The story is called The Holy Night and I feel reading at this time of year. There was a man who went out in the dark night to borrow live coals to kindle a fire. He went from hut to hut and knocked. "Dear friends, help me!" said he. "My wife has just given birth to a child, and I must make a fire to warm her and the little one. "But it was way in the night, and all the people were asleep. No one replied. The man walked and walked. At last he saw the gleam of a fire a long way off. Then he went in that direction and saw that the fire was burning in the open. A lot of sheep were sleeping around the fire, and an old shepherd sat and watched over the flock. When the man who wanted to borrow fire came up to the sheep, he saw that three big dogs lay asleep at the shepherd's feet.

All three awoke when the man approached and opened their great jaws, as though they wanted to bark; but not a sound was heard. The man noticed that the hair on their backs stood up and that their sharp, white teeth glistened in the firelight. They dashed toward him. He felt that one of them bit at his lea and one at this hand and that one clung to this throat. But their jaws and teeth wouldn't obey them, and the man didn't suffer the least harm. Now the man wished to go farther, to get what he needed. But the sheep lay back to back and so close to one another that he couldn't pass them. Then the man stepped upon their backs and walked over them and up to the fire. And not one of the animals awoke or moved. When the man had almost reached the fire, the shepherd looked up. He was a surly old man, who was unfriendly and harsh toward human beings. And when he saw the strange man coming, he seized the long, spiked staff, which he always held in his hand when he tended his flock, and threw it at him. The staff came right toward the man, but, before it reached him, it turned off to one side and whizzed past him, far out in the meadow. Now the man came up to the shepherd and said to him: "Good man, help me, and lend me a little fire! My wife has just given birth to a child, and I must make a fire to warm her and the little one." The shepherd would rather have said no, but when he pondered that the dogs couldn't hurt the man, and the sheep had not run from him, and that the staff had not wished to strike him, he was a little afraid, and dared not deny the man that which he asked. "Take as much as you need!" he said to the man. But then the fire was nearly burnt out. There were no logs or branches left, only a big heap of live coals, and the stranger had neither spade nor shovel wherein he could carry the red-hot coals. When the shepherd saw this, he said

again: "Take as much as you need!" And he was glad that the man wouldn't be able to take away any coals. But the man stopped and picked coals from the ashes with his bare hands, and laid them in his mantle. And he didn't burn his hands when he touched them. nor did the coals scorch his mantle: but he carried them away as if they had been nuts or apples. And when the shepherd, who was such a cruel and hardhearted man, saw all this, he began to wonder to himself. What kind of a night is this, when the dogs do not bite, the sheep are not scared, the staff does not kill, or the fire scorch? He called the stranger back and said to him: "What kind of a night is this? And how does it happen that all things show you compassion?" Then said the man: "I cannot tell you if you yourself do not see it." And he wished to go his way, that he might soon make a fire and warm his wife and child. But the shepherd did not wish to lose sight of the man before he had found out what all this might portend . He got up and followed the man till they came to the place where he lived. Then the shepherd saw the man didn't have so much as a hut to dwell in, but that his wife and babe were lying in a mountain grotto, where there was nothing except the cold and naked stone walls. But the shepherd thought that perhaps the poor innocent child might freeze to death there in the grotto; and, although he was a hard man, he was touched, and thought he would like to help it. And he loosened the knapsack from his shoulder, took from it a soft white sheepskin, gave it to the strange man, and said that he should let the child sleep on it.

But just as soon as he showed that he, too, could be merciful, his eyes were opened, and he saw what he had not been able to see before, and heard what he could not have heard before. He saw that all around him

stood a ring of little silver-winged angels, and each held a stringed instrument, and all sang in loud tones that tonight the Saviour was born who would redeem the world from its sins. Then he understood how all things were so happy this night that they didn't want to do anything wrong. And it was not only around the shepherd that there were angels, but he saw them everywhere. They sat inside the grotto, they sat outside on the mountain, and they flew under the heavens. They came marching in great companies, and, as they passed, they paused and cast a glance at the child. There was such jubilation and such gladness and songs and play! And all this he saw in the dark night whereas before he could not have made out anything. He was so happy because his eyes had been opened that he fell upon his knees and thanked God.

What that shepherd saw, we might also see, for the angels fly down from heaven every Christmas Eve, if we could only see them. We must remember this, for it is as true as true as that I can see you and you can see me. It is not revealed by the light of fairy lamps or candles, and it does not depend upon sun and moon: but that which is wanted is that we have such eyes as can see God's glory. Then there was this little anecdote -It was the week before Christmas. Parking spaces were hard to come by. There were long lines, crowded shops, rude people, and grossly inflated prices. In one long checkout line, one man was heard to say, "They should kill the guy who started Christmas." One wise and godly woman in the line said, "They didthey hung Him on a cross." Therein lies the REAL Christmas story.

A very merry, happy and blessed Christmas to us all.

PASSWORDS AGAIN

Over the last few weeks I have had a number of requests about passwords and the internet and I continue to be astonished at how many people seem to have a universal password that they use for everything or with only a couple of variations. This is a bad idea for so many reasons - the main one is that if a website you are registered with gets hacked into and your details stolen then the hackers can try those login details on lots of other websites and cause havoc. The problem is remembering unique passwords for every website you log in to. Lots of computers these days come with preinstalled tools to help manage lots of password (eq. Some versions of Norton have a password manager, HP computers often have password managers preinstalled). I can't discuss these particular products, there are too many versions and ways of doing things. I would say though it may not be the best idea to get locked into using something built in - the simple fact is if you use HP's password manager your next computer might not be HP and you won't be able to use it, similarly you don't want to be locked into using Norton forever just for the password manager (Norton would like it but it is expensive). The solution I use (and prefer) is one I have mentioned before called LastPass. This allows you to generate completely random passwords for websites of any length and complexity but it remembers them for you and fills them in for you when you visit those websites. The only thing you need to remember is one set of log in details to log in to your LastPass account (hence the name - it is the Last Password you need to remember). All you data is encrypted on the device you use so the people have no way of

looking at or recovering your data if you do forget your details!! The best bit is for computer it is absolutely free. It supports most browsers (certainly all the common ones) on Windows, Mac and Linux PCs. You can also use it on mobile phones and tablets but then you need to pay a subscription of \$12 a year. There are various optional methods you can use to make your account more secure some free and some via hardware devices that you can buy. All in all it is an excellent product and you can access your data from anywhere (even if you are away from home). Check out www.lastpass.com - there is a helpful video that shows you how it works. Discarding computers I was asked to discarding computers and on protecting yourself by removing your data. The answer really depends on what you want to do with the old device If you are throwing it away you need to take it to a local recycling centre (eg. In Moor Road Leyburn) but before you do remove the hard disk. Once the hard disk is removed all personal data is on that one device and there is nothing left of a personal nature at the recycling centre. You can either keep the hard disk if you want to recover the data in the future or destroy the data on it. If you want to pass on your computer to someone else or to a charity probably the best thing to do is to restore the computer back to its factory settings (so it is like a new computer) and then download and run a program that can scrub the unused parts of the hard disk clean. CCleaner (www.piriform.com) can be used for free and included an optional tool to scrub the hard disk clean. Note this can take a very long time (hours and hours). Walk or run on the right hand side of the road so you can see oncoming traffic and be prepared to move along in single file especially on narrow roads and in poor light. It maybe safer to cross roads well before a sharp right hand bend so traffic has a better chance of seeing you. Cross back after the bend. Always show due care and consideration for others. 



NATIONAL PARK AUTHORITY DECISION BACKED BY WHITEHALL

Communities and Local Government Secretary Eric Pickles has dismissed an appeal by Richmondshire District Council and North Yorkshire Country Council against a planning decision made by the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority (YDNPA). Last year the Government decided to scrap local planning controls so that planning permission was no longer required for anyone wanting to change the use of agricultural buildings to some types of commercial use like shops banks. restaurants, offices, warehouses, hotels and sports halls. Members of the National Park Authority were concerned at these proposals on two counts - first, the potential negative impact on one of the most outstandingly beautiful areas of the country, which includes around 6,000 barns. Secondly they removed the rights of local communities, through a local planning process, to have a say on what happens in their area. Members voted in March this year to introduce a Direction under Article 4 of the Town and Country Planning (General Permitted Development) Order 1995 that will effectively retain local control of the planning process so there would still be a need for planning permission to be obtained for a change of use. The District Council and County Council asked the Minister to step in and into the National force the YDNPA to cancel the Article 4 Park." Direction. In dismissing the councils' request, the Minister says the National

Park Authority Members are "particularly well placed" to decide on local planning issues and he has refused to get involved.

Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority Chairman Peter Charlesworth said: "We welcome the decision of the Government to support the National Park Authority's stance on this matter - it is a victory for localism. "It is important to say again that the Article 4 Direction does not mean traditional barns or modern farm buildings cannot be converted to commercial uses. "Indeed the National Park Authority is very supportive of re-using existing buildings but we - and the Government through its decision - recognise that the special landscape in which these thousands of barns sit means that some proposals still need local scrutiny rather than just "going through on the nod". "The Secretary of State's decision means that local people are still able to have their say on applications - whether supporters or objectors - and we will go back to a situation where each case will be judged on its merits.

"Hopefully, we can all now get on with tackling the real challenges facing our remote rural areas, like investing in new affordable housing that meets the needs

of local families and ensuring we have the quality broadband that can attract new businesses

Stations in the area, I am pleased to report that all of our Stations will operate as usual in the next election so remember to vote when the time comes if we are to keep the Polling Stations open.

There is considerable concern over the trend for our young people to leave the area in search of jobs and affordable housing. By the time you read this, the District Council will have hosted a Rural Summit to find ways of tackling this problem. There is a real commitment by the Council to find a way of reversing this trend and attracting younger people with young families to move into the area and secure the future of our play groups, schools, businesses and so on. Using redundant barns to create business opportunities is one issue that needs urgent attention as well as improved broadband service in our rural area. I hope to be able to give news about the symmit soon.

REETH PARISH COUNCIL OCTOBER 27

Overgrown trees At the previous meeting in September it had been reported that the trees opposite Reeth garage were in need of pruning. The clerk had been advised that an arborist would be required to carry out the work.

Bus services Details were received of the revised winter timetable which would be in operation from November 3. These would be displayed in the shelter.

Air Ambulance The council would send a donation of £100 to support the Great North Air Ambulance.

Reeth 20k trail Organisation of this event was not the responsibility of the parish council but they had no objections to it taking place.

Big Dig There would be a public presentation of the findings of the first year of the Swaledale Big Dig project in the Memorial Hall on November 28.

Cycle route National park ranger Michael Briggs attended the meeting to present details of a proposed family friendly cycle route alongside the river Swale from Grinton. The route would use existing rights of way which would need a certain amount of preparatory work to make them suitable as an alternative to riding on the main roads. The council were happy to support bids for funding to cover this work.

Tree planting Members approved a request to plant native trees on land on the north side of the river in order to stabilise the banks and provide an improved habitat for wildlife.

Dog waste It had not been possible to obtain additional general waste bins

through Streetscene so the council agreed to purchase three dog waste bins for key locations in the area.

Remembrance Sunday Arrangements had been made for the parade to begin from Reeth at 2pm followed by a 2.30pm service at Grinton. The additional names had not yet been added to the war memorial.

Water pumps Councillors discussed the various commemorative plaques from the Victorian water pumps on the green with a view to replacing them in their original sites

Commons Act 2006 The clerk would check the map for any extra areas which should be added.

Christmas tree The clerk was asked to source a Christmas tree for the green. The annual carol singing round the tree with the brass band was fixed for 8pm on Sunday, December 21.

Highways The trees growing out of the stonework of Grinton bridge had still not been dealt with and would be reported again.

GRINTON PARISH COUNCIL NOVEMBER 3

Tour de France The clerk had met a representative from the district council to confirm that the grant money had been spent correctly.

Footpath No progress had been made on repairs to the little bridge as, in spite of strenuous efforts by all concerned, no-one had claimed ownership of the land at either end. Councillors agreed that the way ahead was to register the area concerned as parish land. This would enable the national park to carry out repairs although this was not essential as the bridge was simply a convenience rather than a public right of way. In the meantime the bridge would remain closed.

Parish representation District Coun Malcolm Gardner explained the process which would be involved in extending the parish council to include representation from Ellerton for the first time now that the majority of residents from there had voted in favour of joining up. An election would be held on May 7 if required by the number of nominations and the new body would be known as Grinton and Ellerton Abbey parish council.

Parish land A piece of land at Crackpot which had been wrongly designated as parish land when the first maps were drawn up would be deregistered.

Cycle route Details were received from the national park of a proposed family friendly cycle route along the south side of the river from Grinton to Keld. Coun Sunter pointed out that parts of the route were very overgrown and would also need substantial repairs at Low Houses.

Members supported the suggestion in principle but would ask for more information including maps of the proposed route before making a decision.

Precept No changes were made to the precept for the next financial year.

Highways Coun Sunter reported that although some work had been done on laying tarmac and clearing gutters on the Whitaside road it did not seem to have been completed and was in danger of lifting in places. This would be reported to Highways along with the potholes on Crackpotside. Coun Gardner reported that work was in hand to inspect the trees growing out of Grinton bridge and deal with them permanently.

GP services Coun Gardner updated the council on the out of hours GP service which had been moved from the Duchess of Kent hospital at Catterick garrison due to problems with the building. The service had been moved temporarily to the Friarage in Northallerton while premises were being prepared at a GP surgery on the garrison. In the meantime a free taxi service would be provided for patients from the dale who needed transport to Northallerton. In the longer term the out of hours provision would be located at the Friary in Richmond.

Future meetings The next meeting is at 7.15pm on Monday, January 5, in the parish hall. The May meeting will be postponed from May 4 to May 11 to allow for the elections.

GRINTON CONSERVATION PROJECT

Bats Many of you will know there are bats roosting in the roof and probably the walls of Grinton Church. North Yorkshire Bat Group (NYBG) identified three species by using 'emergence' surveys: the Common Pipistrelle, a small bat that likes to eat the smaller Soprano Pipistrelle feeds in and around water habitats; and the Brown Long Eared bat which uses its large ears to listen for the moths it hunts. NYBG counted to see how many bats were still resident in the Church in October: 2 brown long eared; 8 Common Pipistrelle; plus 12 Soprano Pipistrelle. Two myotis bats flew over, but they were not roosting in the church.

For 2015, NYBG plan regular survey nights, 1st Wednesday each month from April - October. Bad weather may mean we swap to a different night - we'll publicise these on our Forum (see link below).

Bees We've topped up the bees' winter honey supplies with concentrated sugar solution to ensure they make it through the winter. We'll complete one more varroa treatment in December, then we won't open the hive until the temperature warms up around April.

Swaledale Festival board members meeting on Thursday 23 October began proceedings with a pleasant surprise. It had been announced earlier that day that Felicity Manning, volunteers coordinator for the Festival, had been awarded their Exceptional Service Award by the British Arts & Science Festivals Association (BAFA) meeting during the Canterbury Festival.

Felicity has been a board member of the Swaledale Festival since 1996 and does much more than her title suggests. She is well known amongst Festival regulars for her ability to find people not only able, but very willing, to carry out voluntarily many of the numerous tasks that Swaledale Festival both as efficient and as friendly as it is. These include not only tasks like stewarding at concerts but collecting artists from airports and railway stations sometimes at inconvenient times of day, or providing them accommodation as many of them prefer this to staying in a hotel. In addition, she served until recently on the Programming Committee advising the professional Artistic Directors of the Festival on the selection of the programme in the light of her extensive local and musical knowledge, and she carries out numerous small tasks in the Festival office in Reeth, where she lives.

It wasn't possible for Felicity to get to Canterbury to receive her award at the BAFA AGM lunch, so a copy of the certificate was emailed through and she was presented with it by Peter Denison-

Edson, Swaledale Festival chairman, at the start of the Festival Board meeting.

A delighted Felicity said "I'm still a bit shocked! I can't remember the last certificate which came my way!" Malcolm Creese, Artistic Director, said, "I wholeheartedly agree with this. Felicity has been a board member since the mid-1990s, and she is invaluable.

The Festival itself has also received four different awards from various bodies over the past seven years, particularly for its community and educational work, including the Prime Minister's 'Big Society' Award, but this is the first to an individual. Next year's Swaledale Festival runs from May 23 to June 6 and the search for volunteers to help with the various Festival tasks has already begun. 

POST OFFICE NEWS DECEMBER 2014

Christmas is approaching quickly and so too are the last posting dates. For example, the last recommended date for airmail parcels to New Zealand is December 3rd; Australia is December 4th; Eastern Europe is December 8th; Canada is December 9th;

USA is December 12^{th} ; and Western Europe is December 13^{th} . For UK items, the last recommended date for 2^{nd} Class is December 18^{th} and for First Class, December 20^{th} .

A reminder for parcels, we are obliged to ask you what is in the parcel and cannot accept it for posting if you cannot tell us; so please make sure you know what is inside if you are bringing it for someone else. And one small point, it used to be the fashion to put string around a parcel, but with the automated systems they use these days, this clogs up the machines, so please, no string around your parcel.

While we are on the subject of Christmas, it's a time of year when we tend to spend more time on the phone talking to family and friends, so if you need a phone top up, we can do that for you at the post office. Make sure also that you have enough cash to last you through the holiday period, especially for the times when the post office is closed for business.

Most people are now aware that it is no longer necessary to display a tax disc in your car, but you do have to tax it and this can still be done at the post office. One thing to note is that even if there is no fee payable, you do need to go through the process of taxing your car. So if your reminder shows a nil payment, don't think that you can just ignore it - bring it in to us and we can process it for you.

Finally, thank you for your support over the past year and may we wish you all a peaceful Christmas and a healthy New Year.







26/10/2014 (56) 12.30hrs: Team called by Yorkshire Ambulance to rescue an injured walker on the Pennine Way on Kisdon Fell, this was 50m from incident 55. The casualty was evacuated to the air ambulance with the help of the Paramedic & team members.

26/10/2014 (55) 13.30hrs: Team called by NY Police to rescue an injured walker on the Pennine Way on Kisdon Fell, a very wild & windy day. We treated & evacuated the casualty to Muker with the Ambulance crew.

18/10/2014 (54) 12.30hrs: While on route to an incident related to the Scott Trial we were alerted to a serious road crash on the Tan Hill road involving a motorbike. The team treated the casualty at scene for 45 mins while the air ambulance arrived.

18/10/2014 (53) 08.00hrs: The team provided rescue cover for the Scott Trial event & treated a number of minor injuries & 1 more serious injury on the route.

09/10/2014 (52) 08.00hrs: Continuation of the search from the incident 51. Fortunatly as we were on route the missing person was located well putside the search are safe.

08/10/2014 (51) 16.30hrs: As the team where heading back to base we received a call from North Yorks Police requesting the immediate search for a missing person, the team along with the police & a search dog from the Cave Rescue Organisation (CRO) searched for 7 hrs without success. See incident 52 for conclusion.

08/09/2014 (50) 15.30hrs: The Team were called by the Ambulance Service to assist with the rescue of an injured walker at Hardraw Falls, with the help of the Ambulance paramedics the casualty was treated & evacuated with the team to the ambulance.


