#### **Mental Health Matters**

I had a few hours to spare, the wall has not responded to any of my recent questions.

I have been getting guite depressed by all the negative media and the small number of people who are looking for somebody to blame, constantly criticising, moaning, and whinging, the "I told you so" brigade and the "don't do it like this do it like that". People may have you", "what's bothering you?" etc . For made mistakes but who has not. I think it is fair to say that most people are working for the greater good.

Mental health is a real passion of mine. The effect of isolation on people's health has commendably been highlighted, while issues of mental health are much more to the forefront than 20- 30 years ago. There is more understanding, empathy and the stigma relating to mental illness has been reduced. There is still a long way to go. At any one point in time, research a solo sport. shows that 1 in 4 of us will have some form of mental health issue. When the have ever done in my life was admit resources allocated to mental health services move closer to that received by other sectors of the NHS it will be was an immense feeling of relief - ima great step forward.

My interest in Mental Health is very psychiatric unit in Durham. I was not visiting! I had taken up an unplanned residency which lasted several months. It was a life changing experience in many ways and a lot of good things came out of it. Mental health problems do not magically disappear but admitting you have issues, a reoccurring theme, would be a considerable step in GP in the first instance. Do not surf the right direction.

aged to consider people's mental health and look out for people struggling.

What you have to consider, however, is that it's not easy to identify individuals who are struggling. You do not get a flashing badge or t-shirt to wear. I was one of those people.... 6 6" rugby players are big and tough....stereotyped of course. A physical presence but with no presence of mind!

I was frequently asked "how are a long time the response was that of denial that I had a problem. It was an admission of failure, a sign of fragility etc. A battle I would win on my own. Asking for help was to be a weakness. There was a fear of some of the classic responses- "What have you to be depressed about?", "pull yourself together".. "you are soft " etc. Ironically in sport you win as a team and to tackle mental health issues it's good to have a team with you, it is most definitely not

I also know that certain people have a reluctance taking medication but as part of a total care package it can make a lot of difference to lots of people. It is however not a quick fix, what works for one person often does not work for others. With a good care package and associated support systems you can be assured that there is light at the end of the tunnel but do not be impatient as it can take a lot of time but my personal experience is that it is a journey massively worth taking

I will re-emphasize the biggest lesson I have learnt is to try to understand that you are not on your own, that many people feel the same way as you, and that by hiding away and trying to sort it out is not a good way

You have to be honest with yourself and look for help. Admitting you have a problem and talking is a massive step forward. As I have already said you do not have a flashing light's on you that lets everybody know. We are very good at hiding away problems, emotions, feelings etc. Wearing your 'I am alright' uniform makes it very difficult for people other than professionals to spot. It has to be a two way process, the cavalry do not arrive unless called. I can tell you , in my experiences, it is the best call I ever made in my life. Maybe you are one of those people that should make a call. Howard Nicholson

The Gutenberg project (https://www.gutenberg.org) offers free eBooks. They are mostly older literary works. Most were published before 1924, with some published in the decades after. There is even an option to download on to a Kindle, which makes a change. Often Kindles manage to block downloads from anything other than Amazon.

You can help independent second hand booksellers by ordering books from them via Amazon's Marketplace. I know Amazon takes a share of the revenue but it certainly gives the booksellers an income stream. You can get books that are in really good condition at a fraction of the price to buy new.

#### A Day In The Life Tagging Sheep

It was an early start. Everyone was up and getting ready for the long day ahead. I packed some food because I always get hungry! Once everyone was ready we headed off up the road to Shaw Farm. Thomas took the Mule, William and Dad took the pickup and Mum and I had the Land Rover. We had to quickly head down the road to Home Farm so we could check Lola and the pet lambs and get the working dog, Tot from Grandma's.

Once we had all gathered outside of the gates of Shaw Farm, it was time to get tagging! Mum and I got all of the tags ready and laid them out on the table whilst the boys gathered together a group of about 25 ewes and lambs with the help of Tot, ready to be tagged. Once the boys herded them into the barn, Dad caught the ewe and me and the boys caught the lambs. I tend to run and jump on mine because I'm light but Dad catches his by the horns. Dad read out the tag number of the ewe and the initials showing who it was tupped by. This was all for Mum to write down.

Whilst Dad did that, I passed my lamb to William to hold, then I got the tags off the table, loaded the taggers and passed them to the boys. The boys tagged their lambs to show who their dad was, and then William painted our mark onto the shoulder of each lamb to show that they were our lambs.

This really helps when the lambs go for a wander and get mixed up with other herds! It was all a family effort and once we had done the first lot of sheep it was time to get the second lot but by this time we had worked out a one-way system. Once we got going you couldn't stop us!

Once we had sorted and tagged that day's sheep and lambs, it was time to head back. We all hopped in our vehicles once again and this time headed down the road to Home Farm. Down there we went around all the sheep and caked them in the Mule. I like to stand in the back with the wind blowing through my hair watching Dad checking all the sheep with the lambs playing Wacky Races in the background!

Everyone had a job to do and once we had all done our bit it was time to head home. For the last time of the day we hopped in our vehicles and drove back to the house for a family night spent by the fire.

## Mountain & Cave Rescue Team

Incidents
April 9th to June 9th

On average we respond to between 50 to 60 calls each year.

#### 3 Incident this edition

The teams focus during the Covid-19 outbreak has been to maintain an operational Mountain & Cave Rescue Service, we've held meetings on-line & limited equipment checks to single members of the team. Fortunately we are well stocked with the essential PPE to protect the team if deployed.

26/05/2020: Incident 18: Called to assist the Ambulance service with the evaluation of a casualty at Aysgarth Falls again.

26/05/2020: Incident 17: Called by the Police early in the morning to search for a missing person in the Middleham area, located by the team and returned to safety.

25/05/2020: Incident 16: Called to assist the Ambulance service with an injured walker at Aysgarth Falls. As the first team members arrived it turned out that the casualty could self-evacuate to the ambulance.

Each month we highlight an item of our rescue equipment; this is how we spend your generous donations. Last month we looked at our waterproofs, this month we thought you might like to see

our all too infrequently used T-shirt base layers! See the photo on the opposite page.

We issue moisture wicking base layers to help keep team members comfortable during rescues. During rescues team members go from slogging up hill & getting too hot, then static while dealing with the casualty & getting cold. The wicking base layers help move moisture away from the body & stop us getting too cold, sweaty & smelly!!



#### **Great Read** View From A Lake

A few years ago I was lucky enough to work with Neil Hayes. A great leader and a lovely inspiring and I would say 'very cool'

fellow. During our discussions Neil mentioned he was writing a book and a year later I purchased a copy. ' A View From A Lake'. I had by that time probably read between 30 and 50 self-help books as was a trend at that time. To better myself or help me with general anxiety I had been suffering. I started his book and for some reason I lost track of where I was. This year I picked it up again and turned directly to Neil's recommendation on meditation OR as it tends to be called now 'Mindfulness'.

I cannot tell you how many times I had tried this and just fallen asleep or become distracted. What really defeated the object was, I criticised myself for not managing to relax. Then I read the section from Neil's book and it was the first book that was realistic about how difficult it was to just stop and stop your mind from wandering. So my book recommendation this month is Neil's book and as is typical of Neil he had no qualms sharing with me, his entire book text. In order that I could share a section that my help readers. So for all those who want to finally succeed in meditation or mindfulness and find it really difficult, read this extract . I hope it helps some of our readers and I recommend you pick up Neil's book from any bookseller.

One note, in Neil's book he mentions Buddha a lot and at first I thought wow that sounds a bit too mystic for me. Far from it, it's quite clear that all this mindfulness stuff is not new and it's not surprising. For 1000's of years our forbears did not have waste-of-time-TV and they had a lot of time to think about life and living.

Anyway please enjoy this from Neil ....

#### A View From A Lake , chapter two, page 34 onwards...

Here are some guidelines that you may wish to consider. They are not the only way, and the intention is not to be prescriptive, but they do embody meditation techniques that are commonly practised and found to be effective.

They follow a simple formula:

Ready Set Let go

We teach through language because that is how we communicate with each other, but please bear in mind that the intention of this teaching is to arrive at understanding through experience, and that the realisation we seek is not well expressed as verbal concepts. It is not our thinking minds that need to communicate with each other here, and ultimately our outer and inner voices need to become ships on the horizon. The awakening of our awareness comes through the actions that the words suggest, not the words themselves. The words are signposts, not our destination. Meditation is best done regularly, ideally at least once a day, and it can be beneficial to do it at a particular time so it becomes part of a routine.

Select the place in which you will meditate. Ultimately, the hope is to be able to be mindful anywhere at all and in any circumstances, but in the beginning it will be useful to select a pleasant and peaceful place where there are minimal sources of distraction. It helps if the field of vision is uncluttered, although it is not necessary to go as far as some Zen monks who face a blank wall in meditation. That said, I personally have gained great value from that method and use it still when the alternative is to face a disorderly space. If there are objects in your field of view that the thinking mind could seize upon, then it may be best to clear them before you start. On the other hand, the presence of a few potential visual distractions does not have to be a problem. They could simply be something to work with, noticing but not reacting to the thinking mind that is telling you that if only you would get up and move that shoe or straighten that mat, then you would be able to get down to some proper meditation.

> Sitting cross-legged is a challenge for many or perhaps most Western adults, and there is no shame in not being able to adopt this position naturally. If you need four cushions, then so be it. I personally favour a quite a substantial pile of cushions as I lack flexibility in both back and knees. An alternative is to kneel, place the cushions between your legs and under your backside, and then sit gently back, knees apart, with the lower leg tucked under the upper leg, calf facing the back of the thigh. In either the cross-legged or kneeling/sitting position, the higher you need your cushions, the more pressure you will place on your knees, so it may help first to lay out a soft mat to give you comfort. Such a practice may in any case help you regard this as your meditation space. These two positions are suitable because they feel dignified, resolute and appropriate for medita-

# Pales Police Report June 2020

The following incidents of note have occurred in the Dales area -

One positive from the lockdown has been a reduction in crimes such as theft and burglary. We have, however, taken numerous reports of anti-social behaviour and breaches linked to the coronavirus rules. We have also received many enquiries regarding our enforcement of the regulations relating to the coronavirus legislation. Here is what we can do.

In all situations we will engage with people, explain the regulations, and encourage them to follow the rules. We will only use enforcement as a last resort.

Upon writing this report at the end of May the regulations state that you must have a reasonable excuse to leave your home. This includes travel to a public open space to promote physical or mental health or emotional wellbeing, either alone, with members of your household or with one member of another household.

You cannot gather with more than two people unless you are from the same household or the reason is permitted under the regulations, for example to attend a funeral.

The Police can fine you if you breach the regulations, but we would prefer not to and hope that you will do what is right to protect your family, your loved ones and other people.


We cannot enforce the Government guidelines, for example the 2 metre rule or the wearing of face masks.





#### **Homing Pigeons**

#### E-Mail of World War I and II

When I moved to Yorkshire I expected that occasionally I would see Racing Pigeon clubs in this area. Not as yet. Anyway I was fascinated recently to read about the role homing pigeons played in the wars including the fact that Lancaster bombers would take 2 homing pigeons on each flight. It's amazing that these birds could be released by downed bomber crew from anywhere, relied on to take a life saving message back to their airfield. warhistoryonline.com. Photo courtesy: **BBC** News item: 23/02/1942, a badly damaged RAF bomber ditched into the N. Sea. The crew were returning from a mission over Norway, but their Beaufort Bomber had been hit by enemy fire and crashed into the sea more



than 100 miles from home. Struggling in freezing waters - unable to radio an accurate position back to base - the four men faced a cold and lonely death. But as the aircraft went down, the crew had managed to salvage their secret weapon - a carrier pigeon. The blue chequered hen bird, called Winkie, was set free in the hope it could fly home to its loft in Broughty Ferry, near Dundee, and so alert air base colleagues to their predicament. Winkie made it home, after flying 120 miles, and was discovered, exhausted and covered in oil and RAF Leuchars in Fife was informed. Winkie was not carrying a message, but the RAF were able to calculate the position of the downed aircraft using the time difference

between the plane's ditching and the arrival of the bird - taking into account the wind direction and even the impact of the oil on Winkie's feathers to her flight speed.

A rescue mission was launched and the men were found within 15 minutes.

#### ARKENGARTHDALE PARISH COUNCIL MAY 2020

Remote meeting arrangements during the Coronavirus pandemic: These were agreed in accordance with The Local Authorities (Coronavirus) (Flexibility of Local Authority Meetings) (England) 2020 as follows: The Annual Parish Council Meeting and the Annual Parish Meeting would both be postponed until next year, and Cllr Stubbs would remain in post as Chair until then; members of the public would be able to access documents and notices of remote meetings on the Parish Council's website and notice board: the Press and the public would be able to access remote meetings (using Zoom) by contacting the Chair for details prior to the meeting; there was a requirement to conduct essential business only until further notice from UK Government.

Coronavirus community support: funding application had been submitted to the Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust for the reimbursement of fuel costs for the Arkengarthdale volunteer delivery drivers. Parish Councillors expressed their thanks to all in the delivery team, and thanked Richard Smith and Susan Dray for setting up and organising the service. The Parish Council was going to purchase Personal Protective Equipment for the volunteers as a matter of urgency, and a grant application would be submitted to RDC's Coronavirus community support funds for these costs. The volunteer delivery team had organised a 'Lamb Count' competition to win a hamper (kindly donatbv the Swaledale and Arkengarthdale Archaeology Group)

and had requested voluntary pledges from entrants to put towards an end-of -pandemic community event. Thanks were expressed to Bruno Iesini, who had very successfully organised and coordinated the competition.

School building: The School Building Community Group had not progressed with raising funds for the school building during lockdown and that the moratorium on the sale of the building would end on 12 June, at which point the building would be placed on the open market.

Affordable housing: The Upper Dales Community Land Trust (UDCLT) with support from RDC and Broadacres Housing Association was interested in bidding for the school building as an alternative site for the affordable housing project, previously intended to be sited next to the war memorial. A Local Needs survey had been undertaken by Cllr Watkins prior to the pandemic. Broadacres Housing Association and the RDC Housing Officer had concluded from this survey that there was a local need. A meeting had been cancelled by RDC's Housing Officer before lockdown and progress had since stalled. A new meeting was scheduled for next week. It was noted that this was a matter for UDCLT, not the Parish Council.

Flooding matters: The Parish Council was working with the YDNPA to reinstate at least one of the four main footbridges destroyed by the floods in Arkengarthdale last July. It was unanimously agreed that the contribution made by Richmond Motor Club for flood-repair work should be put towards the cost of rebuilding the most heavily used bridge in the Dale near Arkletown. .....continued on next page.

It was noted that NYCC were contributing towards other destroyed bridges at Wood House, Whaw and Punchard. The YDNPA was waiting to hear from DEFRA about further possible contributions.

NYCC Highways: The walls near Eskeleth Bridge had been rebuilt well. Highways were waiting for the cap stones to be delivered in order to finish the job when current working practices under Coronavirus restrictions allowed. The hole in the bridge was to be done by the Bridges Dept. There were several outstanding issues and another request for a site meeting would be sent to Highways to address the following: drains still blocked between Arkle Town and Langthwaite; culvert near the Langthwaite sign still blocked; camber on Arkengarthdale Road outside CB Yard causing water to flow towards properties; potholes on Eskeleth to Whaw road and at Whaw; culverts on Stang Lane possibly to clear and erosion on the road sides near the cattle grid on Stang Lane; debris under Eskeleth bridge; drains and culverts still blocked on Bouldershaw Lane; pot holes in road near Langthwaite.

Planning matters: Planning application R/01/164/OH (overhead lines/replacement of poles) at Kitley Cottage, Whaw approved. Planning application R/01/108B at Spence Intake, Arkengarthdale approved conditionally.

#### Friends of the Dales Countryside Museum

The local musicians who led Dales folk dancing right through the night in the early 1900s are celebrated in a book full of fascinating detail and music published as part of the Yorkshire Dales Folk Dance and Tunes Project at the Dales Countryside Museum (DCM) in Hawes.

The author, Bob Ellis of Gayle, has entitled it 'There was None of this Lazy Dancing', quoting a concertina player, Sam Fawcett of Baldersdale (1878-1960). Fawcett said: "When we get a drop of beer... and got into full blast, there was none of this lazy dancing!" And a popular accordion player, Harry Cockerill (1914-1994) who farmed in upper Langstrothdale told of how he would milk the cows on the way home from an all-night dance.

doesn't just give detailed biographies of musicians such as Cockerill, Brian and Jackie Beresford and their family, and Dick and John Wallbank, but also transpositions of their music some of which was almost certainly unique to the Dales. He can assert this because of the meticulous research he has carried out since 2011. "Although the project was my idea, it prompted by comments and suggestions made by Fiona Rosher [the DCM manager]. I was already playing a lot of British and European folk dance music and wanted to add a local element to my repertoire.

"I discovered there were only two people in the Dales (both quite elderly) who were still playing that type of music and that it was in danger of dying

out," he said. Those men were Tim Boothman from Threshfield whose late wife, Rosie, was the daughter of Jackie Beresford, and Sam Fawcett's son, Septimus.

The result is the most complete record to date of Dales musicians and their music in a very easy to read and enjoyable format. Ellis has drawn together all previously published material and, through his own research, been able to add that which has never before been published. As more is coming to light he plans to post it on his website (www.dalestunes.org.uk). The book is in A4 format which has allowed him to print a tune per page along with what is known about it's history. One of Peter Beresford's tunes can be traced back to an itinerant bagpiper in Vienna in the 17th Century. Ellis points out that most of the Dales' musicians couldn't read music. They learnt tunes by ear and then adapted them to the needs of the barn dancers. ....next page

Bob comments: "Dances provided opportunities for people in the scattered neighbouring villages to meet up, exchange news, socialise and enjoy themselves. No wonder village dances were popular - few other events in the lives of Dales folk provided a relief from the drudgeries of daily life, an opportunity to enjoy mation see yourself and socialise and, for the younger people, a chance to meet members of the opposite sex with a view to finding a partner for life."

Bob is sure there was a Dales' style of dance music. When quoting Sam Fawcett that there was "none of this lazy dancing", Bob writes: "To cater for this energetic dancing, the musicians adopted a vigorous, unadorned style of playing that focused more on rhythm than melody." He has included a detailed section on Morris and Sword dancing in the Dales. He states: "Whilst not entirely unique to Yorkshire because isolated examples have been recorded in the Shetland Islands and on the Isle of Man, all the other known longsword dances in Britain originated in villages in Yorkshire (87 in all) or in neighbouring counties. ## Help conserve swifts in National Park

Bainbridge, 26 May 2020



People in the Dales are being asked to help the conservation of swifts by recording nest sites or where they see a 'screaming party' this summer.

Swifts are currently returning from Africa to breed and can be seen in many Dales villages and towns, although populations are in steep decline across the UK. Groups of screaming Swifts flying fast and low are a sure sign that birds are nesting locally. The background to this 'citizen science' project can be found in our latest blog post.

The project is being run by the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority in partnership with the Sedbergh Swift Community Group. Tanya Hoare, a member of the Sedbergh Swift Community Group, said: "Knowing where Swifts nest will mean we can better protect these endangered birds. So why not help by sending your Swift sightings in. Unless we act now, we are in danger of losing them forever."

Member Champion for the Natural Environment at the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority, Ian McPherson, said: "Screaming parties of Swifts are the sound of summer in the Yorkshire Dales National Park. As more birds return over the next few weeks, the parties will get bigger and louder. "Please do take a minute or two to submit a record if you see Swifts flying near you. The more we know about where Swifts are spending their time in the Dales, and particularly where they are nesting, the more we can do to protect this truly wonderful species.

"Being a birder myself I have had a great interest in Swifts for many years and, being a resident of Sedbergh, have been involved with the Sedbergh Swift Group since it's inception." Andrew Fagg

## Reeth Parish Council February

Meeting arrangements Reeth Parish Council held their first meeting by Zoom on May 25 under new regulations enabling councils to hold remote meetings for a specified period until May next year. Arrangements for members of the public to attend meetings will be advertised in the local press and the minutes will be available to read online. Parish clerk The new Clerk to the council is Mrs Christine Steward.

Flood repairs Coun Kendall summarised the present situation regarding remedial work done in the Arkle Beck and payments made so far. The council agreed that some invoices which had been rejected previously should now be paid on the understanding that they would not accept responsibility for that part of the work as they had not authorised it. District Coun Good offered to contribute towards this payment with the rest coming out of a grant received from Reeth Sporting Society.

Playground Arrangements to discuss the replacement of playground equipment had been put on hold due to the current restrictions but one company had offered to provide a free plan and quote remotely. The Clerk would follow this up and would also contact other equipment providers.

Overhanging trees One of the branches from the overhanging trees near Reeth bridge, which was reported to Highways following the last meeting, had been hit and removed by a passing wagon. There were still some smaller branches low enough to cause concern, but Highways have advised that as the trees are on private land it is not their

responsibility to trim them. The Clerk will contact the National Park Ranger to get his advice about cutting them back. Village green Councillors agreed that the green agreements should be sent out as usual. In the past a white line had been painted on the High Row cobbles to protect people sitting at the tables outside businesses from cars parking too close. This had almost worn away. Coun Frankland would check the position of the original line and Coun Peacock offered to talk to Highways about the possibility of them repainting it. A letter of thanks would be sent to Mr Reynoldson for his recent work maintaining the green while Mr Woodward had been self-isolating.

In response to a request from a local resident Coun Frankland would inspect the flagstones outside the Black Bull and if repairs were required he would arrange for an estimate to be provided and for the work to be done.

A request from a resident for authorisation to make some repairs to the Green near the Burgoyne was approved. A request from The Swaledale Festival to erect a tipi on the green next May was approved.

An email regarding the parking of a large campervan on the green was noted but because it is now parked on the highway this is not a parish council matter.

Flag keeper Coun Terry had been raising the flag for several occasions over recent weeks and was happy to continue with this. Coun Kendall would provide him with a list of upcoming dates when the flag should be flown.

**Vermin** A problem with vermin in the Mill Hill area had been reported to RDC after a previous meeting and Coun Good would chase this up. He would meet Coun Terry to establish the exact location of the problem.

Shelter It was noted that Reeth bus shelter smelt of urine and had presumably been used as a toilet. Coun Rutter volunteered to wash it out if the smell remained.

Market Letters of thanks had been sent to all the Reeth market traders who had been delivering to local residents while the market was closed. Councillors expressed their thanks to Coun Guy and her small team of volunteers who had been receiving and distributing the vegetable orders.

Environment An email from the YDNPA Ranger regarding grass cuttings left on the Beckside was considered. Coun Good would ask Richmondshire District Council to provide signs which he would put up at the appropriate place.

The next meeting will be held at 7pm on Monday June 22.
